

How wearable technology can support vulnerable people in the community – the headaches, learning and highlights

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Research and past police estimates suggest around 40,000 people living with dementia go missing for the first time each year in the UK (grampianonline.co.uk)



Dementia UK estimate about 70% of people living with dementia will go missing at least once in the course of their illness, with some individuals going missing multiple times


Initiative:



'Dementia Buddy tags' were first piloted in Lancashire in 2014



There is now a similar '999 Reunite' scheme operating in Manchester. We wanted to stay as close to these devices as possible to reduce confusion but felt having 999 may be interpreted as needing to call 999 and so decided to name our devices 'ReUnite' as its purpose is to reunite vulnerable people as quickly as possible, reducing distress and it is hoped would reduce the 999 calls.



'ReUnite' devices compliment the Herbert Protocol:- The Herbert Protocol provides information about the missing person and helps the police to start to focus in on likely areas the person may have gone (given previous homes, workplaces etc).



We wanted to work collaboratively with people living with dementia and their family carers to ensure they had a voice.



Background:

'ReUnite' devices initially were developed to support people living with dementia who were at risk of becoming disorientated, lost and distressed become reunited with their family carers as quickly as possible. Working collaboratively with our local community we designed and developed the devices and want to share learning and our hopes for the future.

Social media coverage makes us all aware of vulnerable people who have become lost and distressed when out of their usual environment.

Family carers also become distressed and trying to locate a missing person involves members from the emergency services.

Main Aims:

- To improve support for people with dementia and their family carers who live locally when they may feel more isolated, stressed and vulnerable.
- To improve safety and reassurance for people with dementia and their family carers. The device will provide peace of mind to family carers and help maintain some independence for the person living with dementia for as long as possible.
- To reduce time a person is missing, decreasing distress for both the person and their family and may also additionally reduce time emergency services spend searching for a missing person or supporting someone found by a member of the public who is unable to recall their full name/address/contact details for family members etc.

Devices required an email address for each person – not many family carers we spoke to had these or were happy to share it –making us rethink the whole process –the biggest obstacle we faced




Getting started- our community felt the concept was a good one getting started was a challenge.

Learning

Devices required individual email addresses – some of the family carers we consulted said they did not have an email address or weren't happy to share it.

Mark developed an in-house system that removed the need for email addresses.

The Technical Process

The out of the box solution from the tag manufacturer was long and clunky so we created our own web-based portal to interact with the tags



Built so the process takes less than a minute and anyone with a login can 'programme' a device without any tech knowledge.

And on website orders these details are already filled in!

The Technical Process


The portal creates a long url with 2 unique hash keys that are written to a device using a smart phone or tablet with a free NFC app



Every user has a unique url that can be used on multiple ReUnite devices.

When a device is scanned by a smart phone it will open a webpage on the phone that shows the public details of the person wearing the tag and will also update the portal database to show that the tag has been scanned.

Learning



We decided on a 'soft launch'- programming and giving out free devices to people with dementia who were known to Memory Action Group or Wakefield Hospice Dementia Services as we felt this was a good way of testing out the processes we had put in place prior to a full launch.

However what we didn't anticipate was someone in a community setting seeing the device and posting about it on FaceBook.

This led to 100's of enquiries from across the UK which took a lot of time to manage.

So someone came into work today who's husband has dementia and he had one of these on his coat. I've never seen or heard about them and she was saying how very few people have. I asked if I could post this pic on here and she agreed so let's raise some awareness... if you see someone alone and looking lost and they have one of these on show just scan this with ur mobile and it will bring up the details of family so you can get them back home safely. Such a good thing
